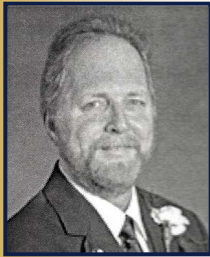

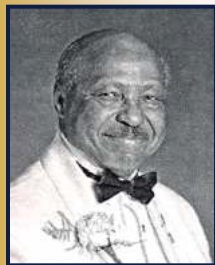

Why would a group of Lions visit Guide Dogs for the Blind campus? Was it for fun? To socialize? To learn more about the services offered? Or to just see the puppies?! For many it was all of the above!

In this day of “smart” phones and reality television, it was good to get up close a personal with an organization that is truly amazing. Guide Dogs for the Blind is not like some extreme make-over show that swoops in and gives a facelift to a house of a family in need and is then gone to never be seen again. Instead, Guide Dog for the Blind spends years training the guide dogs and months melding the guide dog and individual into a team. All is free to the blind individual and is provided entirely by private donations!

The trip. You can't get much better than a relaxing ride to the bay area in a big comfortable bus with other lions! Lion Ida Marcum's now world famous scones were a big hit. On the way home Lion Dick “Archie” Archer and Lion Rob Marshall sang “How Much is that Doggie in the Window” with the help of the rest of the bus. After the sugar wore off from the cookies that were snuck onto our bus by Guide Dogs most of us had a great nap as well.

The tour. Wow! Not only did we get to see the immaculate kennels that contains everything from the wash room to the veterinary hospital area, but we were given a full tour of the campus. It is amazing to learn how carefully dogs are selected and impeccably raised and trained so that the individual they are paired with can trust that they will be kept safe from harm while maneuvering through everyday hazards. Those of us with vision don't even think of what hazards are out there in the world. The guide dogs are trained to keep the vision impaired safe from cars while crossing a street or to maneuver around low-hanging branches on a side walk.



The ceremony. It is the season for graduation right now and we are all proud of our graduates. But this is a different type of graduation. It is more of a graduation toward independence or regaining mobility that individuals once had. This is combined with the dedicated puppy raisers handing off the puppy they raised and bonded with.

The mission. Guide Dogs for the Blind provides enhanced mobility to qualified individuals through partnership with dogs whose unique skills are developed and nurtured by dedicated volunteers and a professional staff. Established in 1942, Guide Dogs for the Blind continues its dedication to quality student training services and extensive follow-up support for graduates. Their programs are made possible through the teamwork of staff, volunteers and generous donors. Services are provided to students from the United States and Canada at no cost to them.



We all enjoyed the trip immensely and are all more knowledgeable of this great organization. Lions would like to thank the Guide Dogs for the Blind and their great staff and volunteers. 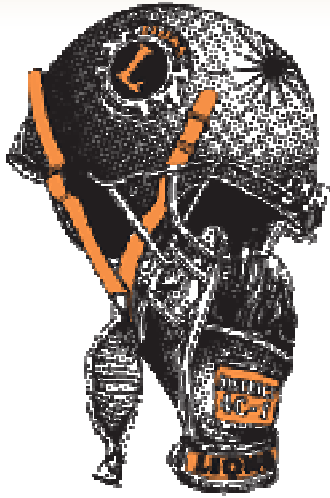


flatbed truck. At present the plan is to place the tables in the park on Thursday June 2nd. The Lions Club symbol embossed on each of them.

Canine Companions for Independence



New Year Request for CCI Action & Support We are experiencing a greater need for fully trained CCI dogs for the many disabled veterans returning injured from combat as well as many others. Lets see if we can bring in more funds with solicitations to the businesses and organizations in your town. (Reminder, it costs approximately ten thousand bucks to train each dog.) Also, I'd like to remind those of you who have a Savemart or Lucky store in your area, to use the Shares card when making purchases. This chain continues to support our

efforts on a regular basis, like every three months we get a check which goes direct to CCI via our Treasurer.

Anyone who is not familiar by now with this program, the routine goes like this. Send me a request for a Shares card if your Chair does not have any cards on hand. When you go to a Lucky owned store such as Savemart, merely hand the card to the check out cashier before that person starts listing your purchases. While not everything is included, the store pays us 3 (three) percent of the total accepted purchases every three months. Their headquarters issues a check direct to our Lion's Treasurer and that is sent direct to CCI.

The Shares card all have the same number, have no cash value. It looks like a charge card. When you are ready to check out at the register, you hand the card to the clerk who either types in the number or asks you to run it thru. Just remember, this has to be done before the purchases are totaled.

Stay warm, stay safe, and please remember to support this worthwhile project.

To honor his life, a Celebration of Life ceremony was held at The Old School House on French Alley in Shasta, CA. on Sunday, April 17th at 1 p.m.

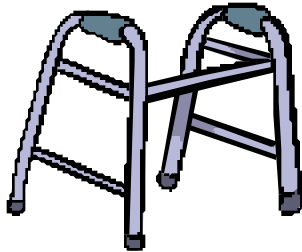

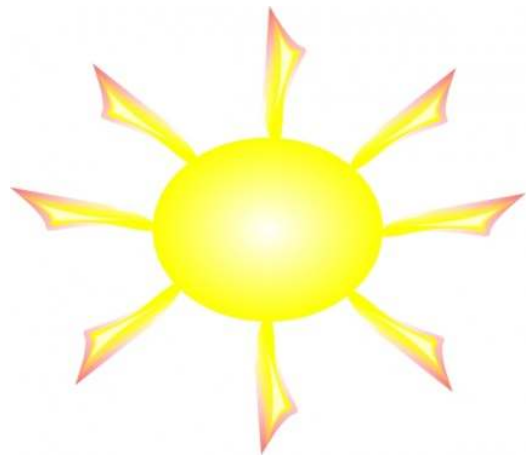
